We have Civil Action 2 Roger Hall, et al., vs. the Central Intelligence 04 - 814.3 Agency. 4 If all counsel will please approach the lecturn 5 and identify yourselves for the record. 6 MR. LESAR: Good morning, Your Honor. James H. 7 Lesar representing plaintiff Roger Hall and Study Solutions 8 Results, Inc. 9 MR. TAAFFE: Good morning, Your Honor. Taaffe for the CIA. With me is Amanda Bloom, who is the 10 11 agency counsel. 12 MR. CLARKE: Good morning, Your Honor. John 13 Clarke on behalf of Accuracy and Media. 14 THE COURT: All right. Does the defendant want to 15 tell me the status first, or whoever wants to go first? 16 don't care. 17 MR. TAAFFE: I'm happy to. 18 THE COURT: Okay. 19 MR. TAAFFE: So I think, Your Honor, just to walk through the remaining issues. The exemption of six items 20 21 are still being considered by civil appellate. I hope to 22 have a decision on that soon, but it's out of my 23 jurisdiction for now. Obviously, if they say no appeal, then we'll release it, and it'll be done. If they do take 24

an appeal, then we'll do what we do there, but I don't think

25

that anything else at issue in this case needs to await that decision necessarily. It's pretty severable, I think, from our perspective. Plaintiff may feel differently.

In terms of the remaining items, I think from defendant's perspective, we're ready to file a supplemental briefing on that, and I'll walk through what we understand the remaining items to be.

First, there were some questions about dates of denied in full documents, and we have those dates and can provide them quite quickly.

In terms of the destruction of files, there were questions about the destruction schedules, and we have the destruction schedules and the regulations setting those forth. The trick is that although those schedules, as they exist today, are not classified, the ones that were in existence at the time in the '80s are and were and remain classified. So we'll need to file a motion to file those for the Court's in camera review. There were 114 documents destroyed pursuant to that schedule. Of course, we can't know what those documents say because they were destroyed, but parenthetically we'd note we're not even sure they would've been responsive. But, regardless, the document destruction schedule and the explanation that we'll provide will explain what happened there.

In terms of the item five documents which have to

do with this P-N-O-K, or PNOK list, the age of the documents in question is considered in the decennial review, and it has been considered in each of those decennial reviews, and we can explain that in a declaration that we would file pursuant to a renewed summary judgment motion. It should be pretty straightforward.

And then item 7, which is records about

Congressional Committee items. There was this, I think,

mystery about why it would've been that -- what's the

gentleman's name? Bob Smith filed a declaration saying that

part of this -- as part of this Senate Select Committee, he

saw certain documents that maybe have not been addressed in

this case in a Vaughn Index. And what happened here is that

in the early 1990s, there was a Senate Select Committee

convened on POW issues, and it was led by Bob Smith, who is

the declarant, and also John Kerry. This committee gathered

materials from all the various intelligence agencies, not

just the CIA. And in 1992 or 3, there was an order calling

for declassification of POW materials.

After that, the committee sent the materials that it had to NARA, which is the archivist, and NARA then referred those documents back to the agencies with equities involved, including CIA. CIA reviewed the documents that were sent to them for a classification and created declassified versions of those documents that it then sent

to NARA. NARA published the declassified versions.

So CIA -- and this was clear earlier in the case in briefing. CIA has permanently accessioned its documents to NARA. But in an effort to get this case resolved, back in 2010, 2011, CIA nevertheless reviewed its copies of those accession documents and processed them as it would in any FOIA case. So the only possibility that the CIA sees is that items that may have been viewed by the committee that have not been sent to plaintiffs or described in the Vaughn Index are ones that perhaps would be in an ops file, and those are ones that the Court has said need not be searched. And we can provide this explanation in a declaration pursuant to a renewed summary judgment motion, but at least as defendant sees it, those are the statuses of the outstanding items.

Really, I don't think a renewed motion at this point would be terribly lengthy. I think we have some discrete issues, and that's it.

THE COURT: When are you proposing to file that?

MR. TAAFFE: The agency would want 30 days or so to put a declaration together. The only trick in that regard is that I have a Title VII trial beginning

October 30<sup>th</sup>, so we would request until maybe the second week of November.

THE COURT: All right. Let me hear from the

plaintiff.

Thank you.

MR. LESAR: Good morning, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Good morning, Mr. Lesar.

MR. LESAR: Well, we had expected that we would have more information as a result of the Court's opinion and the instructions the Court gave at the last status hearing. I understand that the exemption six issue has to wait until there's a decision on appeal. Despite the indication that was given at the status hearing, that did not appear to be a problem. Apparently it is.

With respect to -- the Government was supposed to provide information which it now declares as classified and it seeks to file an explanation ex parte. That's going to require a motion for leave to file it ex parte, which we will probably oppose.

With respect to the decennial review, the Court instructed that certain regulations and decisions be provided, and apparently we are not even going to get the regulations now without it being litigated as a separate issue. It would've been very helpful to have them before we go to a briefing schedule.

With respect to the question of the schedule, I have no objection to time that the defendant proposes for filing its motion; however, I have an extraordinarily

complicated schedule this fall with major cases and major briefs coming due all the way up through December, and so I will need additional time.

I will turn it over to John Clarke, who will have some additional comments, I think.

THE COURT: What's the date you would want to propose for your opposition?

MR. LESAR: Sometime in January.

THE COURT: Okay. If they do November 15<sup>th</sup>, you can do January 15<sup>th</sup>?

MR. LESAR: That I would do, yes.

THE COURT: All right.

Mr. Clarke.

MR. CLARKE: Yes, Your Honor. I would just suggest that the Government's affidavits include its search regarding the imagery that was mentioned in the Court's order and also the 1,400 live sighting reports. We've gotten none of those. So I would just hope that the affidavits would include those.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. CLARKE: Also, Your Honor, the Court mentioned that some of these records that are 60 years old, the Court did not see any reason why, or wanted an explanation as to why they would still be an operational file. So I would ask that the Government's affidavit include that also.
