Dear Mr. Clarke:

This is in response to your client's Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests to the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), dated April 20, 2020, and May 21, 2021. We assigned your request internal tracking number NGC21-632.

This twenty-third release contains 3 electronic files, that contain 6 records totaling approximately 602 pages responsive to your request. After our review, we have determined that 600 pages can be released in full. The two small redactions are being withheld pursuant to 5 U.S.C. §552 exemption (b)(3). The statute in question is 50 U.S.C. § 3024(i)(1), Intelligence sources and methods. The redactions can be located in NN3-518-01-001.



Meeting re: U.S. Army Desert Shield/Desert Storm records

To

Present: representing the U.S. Army were Hannah Zeidlik (U.S. Army Center of Military History), Bill Walker (Archivist, Ofc. of the Secretary of the Army), Edie Miley (FOIA office, ISCP), and Bob Fisher (ISCP). NARA employees present were Geraldine Phillips (NNT), Ronald Swerczek (NNTA), Jeanne Schauble (NND), Michael McReynolds (NNR), Marvin Russell (NNDG), Jim Hastings (NIR), Jerry Nashorn (NIRM), Charles Downs (NNA), and Jennifer Heaps (NNT). The meeting was held at 10 a.m. in Room 100 of the National Archives Building.

Phillips began the meeting by saying that NIR and the Army first began discussing issues relating to transfer of Desert Shield/Desert Storm records in the spring of 1991 while operations were winding down.

Walker said that during the conflict, he visited the field operations in Saudi Arabia to try to determine what was happening to the records being created. He said that Army historians located on-site in some places were of assistance in seeing that records were being properly maintained. Also of concern were records of National Guard units that had Instructions were given to commands to been federalized. retire records according to procedures and that the records should be identified as Desert Storm records.

Miley pointed out that approximately 200 boxes have been and received at the Hoffman Building in Alexandria, VA. They have not yet been opened and examined, nor are FOIA requests for Desert Storm records being processed. She is hopeful that the records being sent are operational and from seeing some of the SF 135's that have been sent with the records, they appear to be so. Records have come from Ft. McPherson and directly from Saudi Arabia. MARKS has not yet been applied to the Saudi records.

The Center of Military History (CMH) also has received some material sent directly there, as well as copies of records located elsewhere. In addition, no official order of battle has been created yet. Walker said that a complete unit listing is expected soon. A National Guard publication has printed a list of Guard federalized units that participated

in Desert Shield/Desert Storm. Walker also mentioned that Ft. Leavenworth is compiling a data base of information relating to Desert Shield/Desert Storm for the purpose of evaluating "lessons learned." He said that the staff there is working mostly with copies of records, but that there are some originals being used. He indicated that the original records extant at Ft. Leavenworth are to be retired to Alexandria once work on the database is completed. Other operational records are still with the various units' headquarters here in the U.S. if they were not shipped to Alexandria directly from Saudi Arabia.

Phillips inquired about the status of records created in the U.S. concurrently that also relate to Desert Shield/Desert Storm. None of the Army officials present could speak to the status of those records for accessioning purposes.

Zeidlik said that there are no current plans for an official history of Desert Storm. She expressed concern over the Army's maintenance of these records for the purposes of writing history. In the past, she said, CMH has retained or pulled records from the Washington National Records Center to work on histories. Often, these records are then exchanged within the Army or lent elsewhere and never returned. Consequently, there are many charge-out cards at the WNRC that list CMH as the current location of some records, when CMH no longer has custody of them. If the Desert Storm records were transferred early, CMH would request copying privileges.

Miley said that she knew that one outside agency requested records from the Vietnam records and did not return them. At this point, the Army is not ready to handle reference requests for the Desert Shield records. The records now at the Hoffman Building are closed to FOIA requests.

Walker said that guidelines for declassification have been received from the Department of Defense. Zeidlik added that the records received from Ft. McPherson arrived with declassification guidelines, as well. Schauble then informed the group that more has to be known about the records before she can evaluate whether the Records Declassification Division's small staff can handle the review that would be required. She said that there are concerns beyond DOD's guidelines; what is the extent of Foreign Government documents and records of other U.S. agencies? Zeidlik noted that already there is concern that issued guidelines are too general.

Walker said that the Army needs to confirm who within the Army will have declassification authority for the records. Currently that function falls to CMH. Miley's office will -need to have the authority if it is decided that a review for declassification should take place while her office

opens the boxes for examination of the contents.

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A.A.A. A. a manager of the second Hastings asked whether the Army would go through the records to separate the temporary administrative records from the operational records. Miley replied that that would be done and that assistance would probably be available from staff at Ft. Huachuca.

Zeidlik asked whether the Army would want guidance from NARA about the arrangement of the records. Nashorn said that if the SF 135s were properly completed, listing the series, and that if MARKS procedures were followed, that would be all the action necessary for NARA to follow the records' arrangement.

Miley suggested to Walker that a call be placed to the commands to report the status of any extant Desert Storm records and he agreed that would be a good idea. All of the Army officials were uncertain about the exact content of the records already received and still located elsewhere, and about the amount of duplciation among records.

Phillips said that NARA really needs to know more about the contents of the records, where they are located, and their volume before NARA can make any decisions about accelerated accessioning. She offered that NARA could consider accepting records in segments over a period of time, rather than all at once, if that were necessary.

Miley requested names and telephone numbers of individuals at NARA whom she could contact for assistance once her office begins to go through records received to date. Nashorn offered his assistance by stating a willingness to examine the records. Miley suggested that Schauble might also wish to look at the records for declassification interests. Phillips also thought this was a good idea and will provide Miley a contact person within NNT who will inform the other divisions about any visit arranged to see the records at the Hoffman Building. مې د د د مېکور کې مې د د و مېږي د د د مې

Alexandra and The Army personnel said that they would discuss the various issues further among themselves and that Miley would probably begin to go through boxes in about one month.

Dear Hans,

It was a pleasure to visit USCENTCOM and meet with you concerning the disposition of the Desert Shield and Desert Storm records. Thank you especially for your hospitality during our visit.

With regard to your options for capturing and potentially distributing copies of the records in electronic form, there are basically three available to you:

(1) Capture of Digital Images

Digital image capture is tantamount to taking an electronic photograph. The positive side is that you have a facsimile rendition of the document including all its markings such as hand notes, marginalia, and signature blocks. The down side of digital images is that they require considerable storage volume. A raw, uncompressed image of an 8½" x 11" document captured at a resolution of 200 dots-per-inch (dpi) is approximately a half megabyte. Using conventional data compression techniques, a 10-to-1 reduction in storage requirements is generally achievable. Another problem in using digital images is that, in archival terminology, there is no intellectual control over the contents of the documents without the development of an accompanying index. The index must developed unless users are willing to browse the set of document images sequentially in search of items of interest. Any index must and should be designed to satisfy retrieval requirements. Different digital image capture systems available off-the-shelf will have different capabilities for accommodating the design, development, and subsequent retrieval characteristics of the index.

(2) Optical Character Recognition

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OCR is an option when considering conversion of contemporary documents consisting primarily of textual material with well-formed characters of the type generally associated with published materials, laser-printed documents, or documents printed with daisy-wheel printers or electric typewriters. The positive sides of this option are (1) There is full control over the informational content of the documents, (2) electronic textual files resulting from OCR are usually about a tenth of the size of the compressed digital image (at 200 dpi) for the same document, and (3) when integrated with special "full-text" retrieval software, the need for an index is obviated. The negative aspects of OCR are (1) the time to capture and convert the documents is significantly longer because of the OCR analysis which must be performed on each document, and (2) only the textual equivalent of the original document is preserved; no facsimile is available and all markups, marginalia, logos, graphics, signature blocks, etc. are lost.

(3) Hybrid Applications

There are systems available which provide the benefits of both the first two options. In these systems, a facsimile digital image is captured and retained and then OCR software is used to convert the textual content of the document. The image file and the OCR text are then electronically linked to each other. The text may be used to search and find documents by combinations of words or phrases, but once found, the document's facsimile image is then made available for viewing or printing. Much as this option combines the benefits of the first two options, it also combines their negatives. In particular, there is now the necessity to store both the image and the OCR versions of the documents.

There is a fourth option which can be considered for high-quality documents such as the ones I observed while at USCENTCOM. That is to begin with a digital image capture using a modest index (i.e., an option-1 system), and then later at some convenient time to post-process the captured images with OCR software to produce an electronic textual equivalent (thereby bootstrapping to an option-2 or option-3 system.)

In consideration of options to distribute electronic copies of the records beyond USCENTCOM, it is advisable to look for systems which employ as much standardization as possible. Since there are almost no applicable national or international standards in force at this time, this means electing a system which uses file, storage, and data compression formats which have been fairly widely adopted within the industry and which show potential for eventual adoption as standards.

Therefore, I recommend that the following specifications be observed when you shop for a system to use in the capture and conversion of the paper records:

(1) Capture Resolution

I recommend that the minimum capture resolution be **200 dpi**. The ODISS project at the National Archives found that 200 dpi was generally sufficient to capture legibly type sizes as small as 6 points. <u>However</u>, if USCENTCOM wishes to OCR the documents or place themselves in the position to post-process the documents at a later date, then I recommend that the minimum resolution be increased to 400 dpi. Doubling the resolution will roughly quadruple the storage requirement, but 400 dpi will greatly increase the accuracy of an OCR conversion within the current state of the technology.

(2) Storage of Gray Scale

When digital images are captured, most contemporary scanners capture gray scale representations. This means that every dot (pixel) that makes up the image is examined by the scanner and assigned an intensity value that will vary between

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perfectly white and perfectly black. Values between the two extremities are considered to be some shade of gray - hence the term "gray scale." Some digital capture systems will then "binarize" the image by picking a manually or automatically selected threshold value and converting all gray scale values above the threshold to black and all below to white. Once this is done, the storage requirement for the image is vastly reduced, because each dot can now be represented binarily with a single bit of storage. If gray scale is to be retained then the amount of storage is determined by the number of levels of gray used. Binarization of the image is advisable only when working with documents consisting of text and/or line-art graphics <u>and</u> if OCR conversion of the documents will never be a consideration. Retention of eight bits (512 values) of gray scale is recommended if the documents contain continuous-tone images such as photographs or if conversion of the images by OCR is being considered for some later date.

(3) Contrast Adjustments

All digital scanning systems have the capability to make contrast adjustments in order to process documents that may be lighter or darker than normal (similar to the contrast adjustment switches on photocopiers.) For example the AG's Canofile 250 has the capability for the operator to select one of three levels of contrast and 16 sublevels thereunder. If all the documents or the vast majority of them are fairly consistent in shade, then a system with manual contrast levels is adequate. If the documents are to be fed in sets in which contrast will vary widely and often, then a system which automatically analyzes each the document and selects an appropriate contrast level on the fly should be considered.

(4) Scanner (and System) Throughput

The speed with which the scanner can capture documents is a consideration if the job needs to be completed within a predefined timeframe. Scanner speeds of 40 to 50 documents per minute are fairly common on the market, but the higher the rated speed, the higher the purchase cost will be. If documents contain information on both the front and back of the page, it would be wise to consider a scanner which captures both sides of the document on a single pass. In general, scanner speed may not be that critically important if there is considerable indexing to be done at the time of capture. Since most indexing is inherently a manual (keyboarding) process, indexing of the images often becomes the bottleneck of the operation. In NARA's ODISS project, this problem was handled by using a system configuration which had one high speed scanner, but multiple indexing stations.

Considering your imposed deadline of completing the task by the end of the fiscal year, another problem facing you is the shear magnitude of the task. If you have 600 linear feet of documents to convert, you are looking at conversion of about 1.5 million pages. Even if a scanner could be operated at a sustained rate of 40 pages/minute, it would require 90 seven-hour work-days to capture the entire set. In reality, the need to perform indexing concurrently will make the process <u>much</u> slower.

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(5) Indexing Capability

Effective indexing is critical to the eventual retrieval and use of the records. Ideally the design of the index should be set before the system is procured. If that is not possible or if there is too much variation in the universe of documents to settle on a single index layout, then a system should be acquired which provides considerable flexibility in the design, creation, input, and validation of the indexes to be used with the documents. Such features to look for include, (1) flexibility in defining the number and attributes of the index terms; something akin to what database management system software provides, (2) flexibility in the level of indexing so that document pages could be indexed individually or in blocks or groups, or could be indexed hierarchically, (3) input capability - primarily through keyboard, but possibly with the capability for file import in case index terms could be captured via OCR or other automated or semiautomated process from the original documents, and (4) validation of index entries against a thesaurus of terms to ensure consistency in terminology and spelling. Ideally, the index should obviate the necessity for a user to deal with meaningless numeric information such as disk numbers, file numbers, or image numbers. In general, the more comprehensive the indexing capability, the more expensive the software portion of the system will be. To be avoided, if possible, is a scheme such as Sgt. Pajil was using in the AG's office where the index was a stand-alone DBMS application wherein a database search would yield a disk and file identifier, but then the appropriate disk would have to be located, mounted in the Canofile system, and the correct file identified to the system for retrieval.

(6) Data Migration and Distribution

Since the distribution of the electronic version of the records is being considered, it is advisable to do everything possible to facilitate this. Since there are few established standards for dealing with digital image file formats or with optical disk drives or media, the recommended course of action is to pick a system that subscribes to as many standards as possible and follows accepted or dominant industry practices where standards fail to exist. Because of the sheer magnitude of an uncompressed image file, digital imaging systems nearly always compress the image data prior to storing them. There are numerous compression algorithms and formats available, but the only ones that are subject to current standards are CCITT Group 3 and CCITT Group 4. These are the same image compression standards that are used worldwide for fax transmissions. There are currently no standards for optical media although there are a number in preparation. Currently, the most popular disks and the ones that will likely eventually enjoy some degree of standardization are 5⁴" WORMs (non-erasable) and MOs (magneto-optical, erasable). (The Canofile 250, for example, uses a 5[']/₄" MO cartridge.) Less popular, but still being used, primarily for their great capacity (2 to 4 GB), are 12" WORM disks.

If one is considering distribution of the images on disk, the proprietary nature of both stand-alone systems, as well as ones integrated from proprietary components, will make dissemination of the image database and any accompanying index a difficult proposition. It is no problem if all the recipients of copies have essentially the same system as was used to capture and maintain the original image files. (For example,

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another Canofile 250 could always read and use the disks produced on another Canofile 250.) But to keep from being locked into one brand or model of the hardware and software, look first for equipment and software that support **GOSIP** (Government Open Systems Interconnection Profile) or the international **OSI** profile. This will guarantee some degree of compatibility with other OSI-compliant systems. If a fully compliant system cannot be found, then look for equipment and software which are networkable into one of the common network protocols (such as ethernet or IBM token ring) and support standard image import/export formats (such as the CCITT standards noted above.) This way, the purchase of specific devices and/or software necessary to read and interpret the distributed image files and indices can be minimized. These few proprietary devices can then be purchased and hooked to any compatible network configuration (e.g., a someone's office LAN which runs Novell Netware and uses ethernet protocol.)

Since there are so many variables that should drive your procurement of a system, I am reluctant to make specific recommendations for candidate systems (although I will go as far as to disqualify the Canofile 250 since it is severely limited with respect to the recommendations on specifications I've already presented.) The truth is that there are very few turnkeys systems such as the Canofile 250 on the market. It is much more common to acquire systems from a systems integrator who will configure a system to your specific requirements from individual components, usually via LAN technology. This is analogous to the old line about going to the Chinese restaurant and picking one from column A, one from column B, If you have access to a technical library on the base, see if you can lay your hands on the *Datapro Reports on Document Imaging Systems*. This series (two looseleaf notebooks of reports) identifies just about anyone and everyone who builds or supplies digital imaging systems, hardware, and software, and gives prices, specifications, and user ratings.

I hope this information proves useful. Let me know if I can be of further assistance.

Subject Visit to USCENTCOM

TO NN CONTRACTOR

This is a report of my visit March 17-19, 1992, to Headquarters, United States Central Command (USCENTCOM), Macdill Air Force Base, Tampa, Florida, to look at records relating to Desert Storm. William Holmes of NSZ, who went with me, has already reported regarding electronic equipment. This report has been delayed because of an automobile accident on March 21, which caused me to be absent from work for several weeks and from which I am now slowly recovering.

As you know, my visit to Florida resulted from a request in early December 1991 from Dr. Hans Pawlisch, historian of CENTCOM, for assistance from NARA with a collection of records in his custody that related to Desert Storm. At CENTCOM's expense, I went to Florida to find out what the "collection" consisted of, if NARA wanted the records, and what archival work, on a reimbursable basis, NARA staff should perform to prepare the records for accessioning after they had been copied on an optical disk. Holmes was to provide technical advice.

During my two-day visit, I looked at the records in Dr. Pawlisch's office and talked with many officers, including Col. D.R. Larned, Deputy Chief of Staff of CENTCOM. I learned the following:

(1) The records to which Dr. Pawlisch referred are not a miscellaneous "collection" of documents but the records of CENTCOM created during Desert Shield/Desert Storm.

(2) Colonel Larned wants to preserve the records by copying them electronically, retain the disks at CENTCOM, and distribute copies to the historical offices of the various services. The original records would be turned over to the National Archives as soon as the copying is completed.

(3) CENTCOM wants NARA staff to come to Florida to arrange and describe the records relating to Desert Storm/Desert Shield because there are no personnel at headquarters with expertise in archival matters. NARA will be reimbursed for these services.

(4) CENTCOM wants the archival work and the electronic copying to be completed by the end of FY 92.

I recommend that we work with CENTCOM to identify, arrange, describe, and accession the records. The historical value of records created by the command responsible for Desert Shield/Desert Storm is unquestioned. Established in 1983, CENTCOM and its predecessor, the Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force, have been responsible for securing the strategic interests of the United States in the Persian Gulf since the overthrow of the Shah of Iran and the takeover of the American embassy in Teheran. Although CENTCOM is interested primarily in preserving the records relating to Desert Storm/Desert Shield, that is records created during the period August 1990 through early March 1991, there may be earlier records that we could and should include in the project. These records document an important part of American history and they should be of interest to researchers for years to come. If we do not act now, the records may be lost and/or destroyed.

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Information about the records in question, however, is imprecise and vague. The best data about them that I obtained is as follows:

(1) Location- The records are scattered. Most are still in file cabinets and desk drawers of the various staff offices of CENTCOM. Only a small quantity of the records are actually in Dr. Pawlisch's office. These consist of documents sent to him as the historian of CENTCOM and also records of J3 (Operations Directorate).

(2) Volume- Dr. Pawlisch initially estimated the volume of records to be 600 cubic feet. Recently, he indicated it may be 1000 linear feet. We really will not know until the project is underway.

(3) Classification- Most of the records are classified "secret;" however, there are some "top secret" documents and Dr. Pawlisch recently indicated there are some "SCI" documents.

(4) Media-Most of the records are textual; however, there are several electronic data bases that CENTCOM wants to give us as well as a small quantity of map overlays, which are now in Pawlisch's office. We may uncover other data bases and maps as the project unfolds. We should not be concerned with audiovisual records. I was told that all such records at CENTCOM are second or third generation copies of records that are at the Pentagon or Norton.

If NARA personnel go to Tampa to work with the CENTCOM records they should do the following:

Appraisal The first task for NARA is to identify (inventory) and appraise the records. I am not aware of any schedule covering the records at CENTCOM, and the staff officers with whom I spoke knew nothing about records disposition or the transfer of records to the National Archives. They indicated that old records are thrown away and that many such rec000242 were destroyed to make room for the records created during Desert Shield/Desert Storm. They contacted NARA because they wanted the records of Desert Shield/Desert Storm to be preserved. If the records are covered by an approved records schedule, we should assist CENTCOM personnel to apply it.

<u>Project Work</u> The next task for NARA personnel is to arrange and describe the series and pack the records for shipment to Washington. Because of time constraints, descriptive work should be minimal, probably no more than title-line descriptions.

<u>Electronic Copving</u>-Our work in this area should be limited to advice, which NSZ is providing, and arranging and describing the records so that they can be copied in an orderly manner. The basic project work mentioned above should accomplish this. We cannot, and should not, prepare an index. Indexing 600 to 1000 cubic feet of records would take years and could not be completed by the end of FY 92.

As soon as arrangements with CENTCOM are completed, I recommend that two archivists from NARA go to Tampa. One should be responsible for all work related to appraisal and the other for the project work outlined above. The work of the two, however, should not be exclusive. The series descriptions on the 115, which the appraisal archivist prepares, should be the basis for the arrangement and descriptive work performed by the project archivist. The appraisal work should take four to six weeks; the project work about six months. Appraisal and project work would take place concurrently although the appraisal archivist could return to Washington as soon as his work was completed.

I do not recommend sending a technician to Tampa unless CENTCOM is unable to detail personnel with the necessary clearances to the project. NARA personnel should not do the electronic copying, and we do need a technician for the basic project work.

I also recommend that we err on the side of taking too many records rather than too few. The 115 should be written in such a way that NARA has the authority to dispose of duplicates, non-record material, and routine housekeeping records during archival processing.

NARA should avail itself of the opportunity to acquire the historically valuable records created by CENTCOM. We have a unique opportunity to prepare the records before they are accessioned and to learn a great deal about them from the people who created them. I found Dr. Pawlisch and the CENTCOM staff very cooperative and personable, and I feel certain that the NARA personnel sent to Tampa will have a similar experience. This project should be mutually beneficial to both NARA and CENTCOM.

Please let me know if I can be of further assistance.

Subject : Visit to CENTCOM, June 29-July 2, 1992

My second visit to CENTCOM was to define the scope of the NARA/CENTCOM project relating to the records of Desert Shield/Desert Storm and to discuss administrative matters relating to Howard Feng's forthcoming detail to CENTCOM to process these records. Mr. Feng and I arrived in Tampa on Sunday evening June 28 and were met by Dr. Hans Pawlisch, command historian. For the next three and a half days we reviewed the project, looked at records, and discussed administrative matters with Col. H. D. Watson, Deputy Chief of Staff, and with Major Larsen, Comptroller's Office.

Attached to this report is a list of the CENTCOM offices that have produced records that will be included in this project. The list includes an estimate of the volume of the records, their current location, and any information about the records that we were able to obtain. In Dr. Pawlisch's office are records of J2, J3 and smaller collections, mainly from the Public Affairs Office and the Programs and Budget Division. We visited the offices of J5, the Provost Marshal, the Comptroller, and the Combat Analysis Group. Staff from J2, J3, J4, and the Scientific and Technical Advisor visited us. Pawlisch obtained estimates of the volume of records in the remaining offices.

Pertinent facts regarding the CENTCOM Desert Shield/Desert Storm textual records that Feng will process are as follows:

(1) The total volume will be between 200 to 300 feet. Dr. Pawlisch has over 114 feet of records in his office. Based on the records we saw in four offices and on verbal estimates from other offices, there are 100 feet in other file stations. Even if we "uncover" additional records as the project progresses, I do not believe the total will be more than 300 feet and most likely closer to 200 feet.

(2) The records have been segregated. CENTCOM has followed NARA's instructions to keep records relating to Desert Shield/Desert Storm as a separate collection.

- (3) There is little, if any, temporary material among these records. All records can be considered scheduled under the Air Force disposition manual.
- (4) The security classification of the records is "secret." "Top secret" documents are controlled by the Adjutant General's Office. Dr. Pawlisch believes that there are few documents that have not been downgraded to "secret." The Adjutant General will give Pawlisch the "top secret" inventory. Pawlisch does not believe these documents will be a problem.
- (5) Most of the records were created at CENTCOM forward (Saudi Arabia). Some were created at CENTCOM rear (MacDill). Records from the two headquarters are separate in most offices. In other cases, such as records of the Comptroller, it does not matter.
- (6) Most of the records are computer-generated standard sized hard copies. With few exceptions, most work papers have been removed.
- (7) The records that are still in the records stations appear to be well arranged. Those that are still in the cartons in which they were transferred from Saudi Arabia are not so well arranged. Most of these are in Dr. Pawlisch's office.
- (8) Arrangement may not be as difficult as determining provenance, locating missing parts or pieces of series, and understanding the relationships of the records. A large quantity of the records appear to consist of messages, intelligence summaries, and situation reports. The provenance of many of these is not always evident, especially since modern records are widely distributed. Pawlisch has collected records from many sources. Many series may also not be "complete" in that messages or reports for weeks or months may be missing.
 - (9) Although the maps and overlays in Dr. Pawlisch's office will be transferred to NARA, these records will not be scanned. Feng will need guidance from NS (Cartographic) regarding the packing of these records.
 - (10) SCI documents created by J2 and the Special Operations Command will not be included in this project. If these documents are not turned over to NARA directly, we are to receive an inventory of the documents sent to DIA.

I estimate that Feng's work in arranging, describing, and boxing the records should take no more than four months. We should complete our part of the project as cuickly and expeditiously as possible. I recommend that Feng concentrate on arranging and boxing the records, performing only the most essential "holdings maintenance" work. I also recommend that his "descriptive work" be the equivalent of a 115 that will clearly show what records are being transferred to NARA. At your convenience, I need to discuss such administrative matters as the transfer of supplies (boxes and folders) to CENTCOM and the transfer of the records to NARA once the records are scanned.

I also recommend that Feng's work commence as soon as possible. The interagency agreement has been signed. As you know, this agreement applies only to FY 92, and a new agreement must be signed in September for FY 93. Although there is no indication a new agreement will not be forthcoming, the fiscal year is quickly passing and the project should begin in this fiscal year. CENTCOM staff believe they will have the optical scanner within 30 to 60 days. The personnel at CENTCOM are changing frequently. If we delay the project, we may have to deal with a new group of players. Dr. Pawlisch, Howard Feng, and Major Larsen (Comptroller's Office), and I tentatively agreed that Howard could begin work on July 27. The project would therefore be well underway when the fiscal year ended.

There is, however, one major problem. CENTCOM is planning to move Dr. Pawlisch's office, including the NARA/CENTCOM project, to a trailer. Because of security considerations, this means that all records would have to be stored in safes. I indicated to Colonel Watson that this was not an ideal work situation and that Mr. Feng would need open storage to sort, arrange, and store the boxed records. Colonel Watson said that he was pressed for space, would try to accommodate us, and suggested we postpone sending Howard to CENTCOM for a month. I do not know what that means but I am to call Dr. Pawlisch in a few days.

As indicated above, almost all of the records Howard Feng will be processing are textual. There are, however, some maps, grahps, and overlays (now located in a large bin in Pawlisch's office) and there are also some electronic data bases, particularly the JOPES messages, that CENTCOM seemed interested in giving NARA .I recommend that NSX contact CENTCOM regarding the electronic records.

I am also concerned about the disposition of the SCI documents in the custody of both J2 and the Special Operations Command Central (SOCCENT). While NIR is technically correct that CENTCOM has a records management program and is following the Air Force disposition manual, I believe that were it not for Desert Shield/Desert Storm, few CENTCOM records would be considered permanent.

The NARA/CENTCOM project should go forward. If we do not assist with the arrangement of the records, we may never get them. I am also hopeful that once the project is underway, more records will be added. CENTCOM RECORDS RE DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM

Commander in Chief (CCCC)

No records now. General Schwarzkopf has message file which may be added to "collection." Volume of this file is estimated to be 4 ft.

Deputy Commander in Chief (CCDC)

No records.

Chief of Staff (CCCS)

Pawlisch's office. One 2-inch folder of "Fact Papers", Oct. 19, 1990-Feb. 1991. May be records of Chief of Staff, may be records of Public Affairs Office or other office.

Scientific and Technical Advisor

In office of Scientific and Technical Advisor. Did not see records. Volume of records based on verbal description of officer who visited us in Pawlisch's office.

Inspector General (CCIG)

In IG's office. Did not see records. Volume of records based on information transmitted to Pawlisch via telephone.

Protocol Office (CCCS-P)

In CCCS-P's office. Did not see records. Volume of records based on information transmitted to Pawlisch via telephone.

Programs and Budget Division (CCPB)

In Pawlisch's office. Three 2-inch binders of "CENTCOM Ground Assessments", Sept. 3-1990-Sept. 28, 1990; Oct. 1, 1990-Nov. 30, 1990; Dec. 30, 1990-Feb. 25, 1991. "Assessments" for December 1990 appear to be missing.

Command Historian (CCHO)

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In Pawlisch's office. In file drawers and scattered about office. Did not look in file drawers. Many of these may be records of staff sections. Some will be scanned and retired to NARA as records of the historian.

Director of Personnel (CCJ1)

In file station. Did not see records. Based on verbal estimate given to Pawlishch.

Director of Intelligence (CCJ2)

In Pawlisch's office. One file drawer of Intelligence Studies. Ca. 3 large boxes of Intelligence Requests, Reports, Miscellany, and Videos (3 or 4), Sitreps, and Reports from Other Intelligence Agencies. Two file drawers (complete set) of Daily Intelligence Summaries (beginning January 17, 1991). Large box of Graphics, Maps, Overlays. Maps and graphics will not be scanned.

In SCIF are 500 to 1000 documents that will not be scanned. Documents are to be turned over to DIA. NARA will get an inventory of these documents. There is a slight possibility that these documents will be given to NARA directly. In any case, they will not be a part of the project.

Director of Operations (CCJ3)

65 ft.

In Pawlisch's office, with the exception of eight boxes that are "out." Consist of Message Files, Situation Reports, and Deployment Schedules. Messages in Pawlisch's office include all messages that were kept at Message Center at MacDill, which was in operation throughout crisis and war. Beginning August 24, 1990, there was also a Message Center in Saudi. Messages from both CENTCOM rear and CENTCOM forward are in They are separate. Major Leidecker, who Pawlisch's office. came up to talk with us, said Message Center purged files every 30 days. Messages went to CAT (Crisis Action Team) and JOC (Joint Operations Command). There may be some duplication among two "files". Situation Reports (SITREPS) are in boxes on top of file cabinets in Pawlisch's inner office. Deployment Schedules, TPFDD's (Time-Phase Force Deployment Data) are computer print outs in large box on floor of Pawlisch's office.

<u>Director of Logistics and Security Assistance (CCJ4/7)</u> <u>20 ft.</u>

In J4 office. Did not see records. Volume estimate and description based on statement of officer from J4 who came to Pawlisch's office. Officer estimated there were 9-10 file drawers of Desert Shield/Desert Storm records. He said records related to mobility, security assistance, and plans (civil engineering).

Director of Plans and Policy (CCJ5)

In J5 office. We viewed records from a distance. Records consist of 19 to 20 binders.

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Director of Command and Control, Communications, and Computer Systems (CCJ6)

No records.

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<u>Staff Judge Advocate (CCJA)</u>

One folder of loose documents, "War File", Feb.-Mar. 1991 in Pawlisch's office. Other records are in JAG office. Did not see records. Volume estimate based on telephone conversation to Pawlisch. Records relate to "political affairs" in countries that are in CENTCOM's area of responsibility.

Public Affairs Office (CCPA)

In Pawlisch's office are: Media and Press Briefs (ca. 1 ft.); and 11 volumes of press reports (ca. 3 ft.).

In CCPA office are 1 file drawer of records which we did not see. This volume based on telephone conversation.

Provost Marshal (CCPM)

In CCPM's office, one file drawer. We looked at file drawer. Records relate to policies regarding enemy POWs.

Comptroller (CCCO)

. In CCCO's office, two file drawers. We looked at file drawers. Mainly case files showing how war was paid for.

Command Surgeon (CCSG)

In CCSG's office, two file drawers. Did not see records. Volume based on telephone call to Pawlisch.

Director Combat Analysis Group (CCCA)

In CCCA's office. One and two-thirds file drawers and six 3inch binders. Saw records. Consist of one file drawer of "day packs", Jan. 17-March 3, 1991; miscellany (2/3 of a drawer); and studies/analyses during defensive phase of crisis.

Combined Headquarters Coalition Forces (C3IC)

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In Pawlisch's office.

"Ernest Will" Collection

The Air Force report does not adequately address our concerns, particularly regarding those CENTCOM files accumulated prior to Desert Shield/Desert Storm. Nevertheless, we do not believe anything would be gained by pursuing this matter further with the agency. Developing a schedule for use by CENTCOM and other unified commands is the best means of ensuring the preservation of their permanently valuable records. This is a high priority project for NIR and has been assigned to two experienced archivists (Dick MacKay and Linda Ebben).

We are sending the enclosed materials to you primarily for information. However, we also would be interested if NNT can shed any light on CENTCOM's assertion that General Schwarzkopf's office has returned all official records to government custody.

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

1. In response to your 9 Apr 93 letter, the following is provided for your information and use in response to inquiries from NARA:

a. STATEMENT: No CENTCOM records pre-dating DESERT SHIELD/ DESERT STORM appear to be extant. None have been retired to NARA nor have any been located, to date, at MacDill AFB.

DISCUSSION: To the contrary, records for CY 83-87 have been retired to the Washington National Records Center (Encl 1). This command is complying with Air Force Records Management procedures as confirmed by the 14 Jul 92 Records Management Program Review conducted by Mr. Jay Rivest, SAF/ AAIA (Encl 2).

b. STATEMENT: A collection of materials pertaining to escort operations in the Persian Gulf, 1987-1990 (Operation ERNEST WILL), is considerably smaller than what we had initially been led to expect.

DISCUSSION: Surviving CENTCOM records from Operation ERNEST WILL, 1987-1990, are included in the Operation DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM archive project currently underway. These records comprise the total holdings this command has on Operation ERNEST WILL.

c. STATEMENT: The total volume of all the records that have been located on Operation DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM is relatively low and very few files are classified above SECRET.

DISCUSSION: The current collection of Operation DESERT SHIELD/ DESERT STORM files set aside for archiving are all that currently exist from that time period. These are CENTCOM generated documents and do not necessarily include those records created by our component commands. With respect to the security issue, many of these documents, although originally classified TOP SECRET, were downgraded after the war in accordance with the DOD Declassification Guidance for Post-DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM. In addition, following an agreement with the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) on 16 Apr 93, USCENTCOM will forward TOP SECRET/SCI documents to the DIA History Office for electronic disposition. DIA will then retire the paper copy of these records to the NARA

SCI facility at Suitland, MD.

d. STATEMENT: We were informally told that General Schwarzkopf has retained his message file and possibly other official records.

DISCUSSION: Our records which were verified by a conversation with General Schwarzkopf's office, indicates that all official records have been returned to USCENTCOM.

2. All records covering the period of Operation DESERT SHIELD/ DESERT STORM are currently being archived within the Adjutant General Division and as records sets are scanned, they will be packaged for retirement to NARA in accordance with established procedures and the MOU between NARA and USCENTCOM. With the addition of the Excalibur system, NARA should see an increase in the amount of historical records retired from this headquarters.

SUBJECT: Report of Records Management Program Review - INFORMATION MEMORANDUM

Reference our letter of 7 May 92, subject: Records Management Program Review.

Mr. Jay N. Rivest visited your organization 9-10 Jun 92. Your personnel exhibited professional knowledge of records management and were courteous hosts.

Personnel contacted:

Lt Col G. F.McGowan, USA, Adjutant General SMSgt G. F. Skinner, USAF, Administrative Superintendent MSgt B. J. Barron, USAF, Command Records Manager Sgt M. Stallings, USA, Headquarters Records Manager Dr. H. S. Pawlisch, Command Historian Mr. A. A. Longo, Records Manager - MacDill AFB (ACC)

Authority: USCENTCOM properly manages its program under the Adjutant General Division of the Manpower, Personnel and Administration Directorate.

Directives: USCENTCOM published its well-written Regulation 340-2, Records Management Program, on 15 May 86 and is preparing to update that regulation. The draft of the revised directive is dated 1 Jun 92.

Program Design: USCENTCOM models its records management program on that of the US Air Force.

a. Management training: The Command Records Manager trained one-on-one with the Air Combat Command (ACC) host-base records manager and often queries Air Force headquarters level to discuss policy alternatives and procedural issues. He has requested funding to attend private industry-sponsored conferences and seminars. The Headquarters Records Manager attended host base records management training and is designing a USCENTCOM-unique records orientation course. b. Identification of tasks: Both the Command and Headquarters Records Managers are knowledgeable about the tasks required of their positions. The tasks have been formally identified in their prescribing directive.

c. Assignment of responsibility: Responsibilities are properly assigned. Using the Air Force model, USCENTCOM has records managers, functional area records managers (FARMs), chiefs of offices, and records technicians involved in the management of official records.

d. Reference materials and computer hardware/software: The USCENTCOM records management office has current reference materials from Congress, Office of Management and Budget (OMB), National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), General Services Administration (GSA), and Department of Defense (DOD). The command has modern computer systems capable of sustaining an outstanding function.

e. Publicity and awareness: The command crossfeeds information from Air Force headquarters to its subordinate activities.

Program Implementation:

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a. Records Creation: The command records manager is considering adding review of all publications and forms into USCENTCOM Regulation 340-2 to ensure that all records are identified and scheduled.

b. Records Maintenance (Records Information Management System (RIMS)): The command is embarking on a conversion of its filing systems to the Air Force RIMS. Software and hardware are available, although some unique recordkeeping requirements may necessitate minor alteration to the standard Air Force program.

c. Records Disposition and Retention Schedules: USCENTCOM uses the Air Force Regulation 4-20, Volume 2, which is sufficient for its needs. The command has no plans to issue its own retention schedule.

(1) USCENTCOM will accomplish routine records retirement (using SF 135) independently of the Air Force. Although the base-level records manager has offered USCENTCOM storage space for its inactive records, USCENTCOM anticipates that it will not need to exercise this option. Should USCENTCOM exercise its option for storage, the base-level records manager will preserve the integrity and identification of USCENTCOM records.

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(2) Before USCENTCOM offers records to the National Archives, it will coordinate with the Air Force Records Manager using SF 258.

d. Electronic Recordkeeping and Document Imaging: USCENTCOM operates at least one optical disk imaging system and is planning additional systems. A system is under consideration for historical records; the Command Historian has sought NARA advice about system design and specifications.

e. Federal Register and Code of Federal Regulations: USCENTCOM monitors issuances of these publications and retains copies when necessary.

f. Mobilization/Deployment: With its extensive experience from the Gulf War, USCENTCOM has established a reliable approach for records management during deployment. Its latest Security Assistance Policy, Administration, and Management (USCENTCOM Regulation 12-2, 1 Dec 91) provides guidance and a checklist to cover day-to-day records management outside the headquarters.

Program Evaluation and Enhancement:

a. Internal management reviews/self-inspections: USCENTCOM published an inspection checklist which is also used for records management staff assistance visits. Section 6-1, Files Maintenance and Records Management, provides a comprehensive guide for their records managers, FARMs, office chiefs, and records technicians.

(1) The Headquarters Records Manager conducts staff assistance visits annually. Visits are thoroughly documented with a cover letter to the office chief and an attached completed checklist (CC Form 274). A neatly maintained and organized heavy-duty folder for each functional area houses all documents pertinent to managing the records.

(2) The Command Records Manager conducts staff assistance visits overseas to USCENTCOM Areas of Responsibility (AORs) in the Middle East. He provides on-site training and thoroughly reviews records management practices. Physical checks of the filing systems during a walk-through at each unit ensure that operating procedures are checked for validity and implementation.

b. Plans for improvements:

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(1) The Records Manager will convert to RIMS for better identification and control of records.

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(2) The Command Historian, in coordination with the records manager, has identified a special Gulf War documents collection and intends to offer it to the National Archives. The command is working directly with Archives personnel to accomplish this project.

Enclosed for your signature is a Standard Form 258 for 165 cubic feet of records accumulated by the U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) during Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm. These records, which are in the CENTCOM Historian's Office, have been arranged and described by a NARA archivist on detail to CENTCOM and will be transferred to us after CENTCOM has copied them on to optical disk. If you concur in this transfer, please sign the enclosed SF 258 and return it to me.

We very much look forward to receiving these records, which will be a valuable addition to our holdings. We are, accordingly, grateful to Air Force and CENTCOM for agreeing to their early transfer. We are, however, concerned that other CENTCOM records may have been destroyed without authorization or otherwise alienated. For example:

1. No CENTCOM records pre-dating Desert Shield/Desert Storm appear to be extant. None have been retired to our FRCs nor have any been located, to date, at MacDill AFB.

2. A collection of materials pertaining to escort operations in the Persian Gulf, 1987-1990 (Operation Earnest Will), is considerably smaller than what we had initially been led to expect.

3. The total volume of all the records that have been located on Desert Shield/Desert Storm is relatively low and very few files are security classified above SECRET.

4. We were informally told that General Schwartzkopf has retained his message file and possibly other official records.

We would very much appreciate your looking into the matters outlined above and letting us know what you learn. To better ensure the preservation of records of CENTCOM and other unified commands, NARA will, during FY 94, work with the Office of the Secretary and the services to develop a generic schedule for these organizations. As an interim measure to avert the disposal of historically valuable records, we suggest that you ask CENTCOM to use the rules applicable to the highest echelon of command (i.e., HQ USAF and/or MACOMS) when they apply the disposition instructions contained in AFR 4-20.

At your suggestion, NN-B asked Elaine Everly, NN-W, to contact various CENTCOM personnel about possible contamination of Desert Shield and Desert Storm records. The contamination might have been from either chemicals used in the war or by fumigation of the records at a later date. The inquiry was prompted by the illness of a NARA archivist who had spent several months on a detail at a military base working with the records and whose doctors said they could not rule out the possibility that exposure to some chemical on the records might have been a cause of his illness. Ms.Everly was asked to make the inquiry because she is an experienced military archivist with various contacts at CENTCOM.

She spoke to several people at CENTCOM. She was told by various people, including a colonel in the Surgeon's Office, that there has been no unusual or serious illnesses among the military people working with the records. There also has been no fumigation of the records.

Ms. Everly also was told that circa 40% of the records were created in Florida and had never been abroad while most of the rest came from Headquarters in Saudi Arabia. In other words, very few - if any - of the records were at places where they might have been exposed to chemical contamination from warfare.

This memorandum responds to your 3 December 1993 letter to Secretary Widnall, asking the Air Force to determine whether or not General H. Norman Schwarzkopf maintains in his custody any official CENTCOM records. On 10 January 1994, I forwarded your query to Major General Freeman, the CENTCOM Deputy Commander in Chief and Chief of Staff, for action (Atch 1). According to his interim response on 26 January 1994, CENTCOM had no indication they are missing any official documents (Atch 2). General Freeman did, however, write to General Schwarzkopf on 26 January 1994, asking him to provide any original official documents or respond for the record that he does not possess any such documents (Atch 3).

After receiving General Schwarzkopf's response, General Freeman responded to us with a 3 February 1994 letter, concluding allegations that General Schwarzkopf took official records are not supportable (Atch 4). General Schwarzkopf's 1 February 1994 letter to General Freeman goes into more detail in describing the nature of the Gulf War documents that he maintains, including a description of his personal log books (Atch 5).

The CENTCOM staff has examined the allegations and determined that General Schwarzkopf's personal logbook is not an official record. Based on the description contained in General Freeman's 26 January letter (Atch 2), the logbook contents fall within the category of work-related personal papers. Therefore, CENTCOM concluded that General Schwarzkopf does not maintain in his custody any official CENTCOM records.

SUBJECT: General Schwarzkopf Records Review

This is a follow-up to our earlier response concerning allegations that General Schwarzkopf retained official government records. A copy of General Schwarzkopf's response to CENTCOM's inquiry is attached for your review. We have carefully reviewed his response and believe it comports to our conclusions that CENTCOM is in possession of all official records concerning Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm.

General Schwarzkopf indicated he has once again gone through all Gulf War-related documents in his possession and reiterated his earlier position that he does not possess nor did he ever take into retirement any original documents, maps, phone logs, etc. General Schwarzkopf has also reassured us that the only graphic materials in his possession are those presented to him upon his retirement.

With this review, U.S. Central Command is satisfied that any such allegations against General Schwarzkopf are insupportable, and recommend you relate our conclusions on the "personal logbook" and any other records, as addressed in General Schwarzkopf's response, back to the Acting National Archivist.

This is in response to your letter of 26 January where you asked if I would either provide to you any original Gulf War documents that I might have retained or respond for the record that I do not possess any such documents.

As a result of your inquiry, I have once again gone through all Gulf War-related documents in my possession. This search has once again yielded negative results. I do not possess now nor did I ever take into retirement any original documents, maps, phone logs, etc. The only thing that I have in my possession that could be construed as original graphics are the unclassified schematic briefing boards that I used to brief the press in what has come to be known as the "mother of all briefings." These were given to me by my staff as a souvenir upon my retirement, and I can hardly believe that this is depriving anyone of original-source material, since that entire briefing was the subject of a video tape that was made available to the public and widely sold across the U.S. (For the record, I had nothing to do with this video presentation nor did I receive any compensation for it.) Other than these briefing boards, the only documents I have in my possession are copies of original documents and these are very limited in number.

I did not find these results surprising since, on my instructions, my transition staff - went to great efforts to ensure that all classified documents were properly downgraded, processed, and returned to Central Command prior to the dissolution of my military staff. Of the limited copies of documents I may have had in my possession, most have subsequently been destroyed, since they were only copies and were of little historical value to me.

Regarding my personal log books, it has been charged that these are phone logs and therefore official documents. This is an incorrect description. While there is no question that these books describe the substance of private conversations I had with many people during Desert Shield and Desert Storm, they also describe personal face-toface conversations I had, letters that I received, anecdotes that were related to me, and personal thoughts. Most of the substance of these books was personally dictated by me to my personal staff for my personal use and was never intended for official use or public disclosure.

Atch 51 00268 In answering the inquiries you receive, I hope you will make it clear that when contacted by *Newsweek* regarding the charges that they made in the article, I not only provided all of this information but a great deal more concerning the specific allegations. I further informed them of independent sources that they could contact to verify the truth of what I was saying. As a result, *Newsweek* delayed the publication of the article for two weeks but subsequently chose to publish these charges without bothering to verify their veracity. I find it shameful that the American taxpayer's money is now being wasted by the time and effort required to investigate charges written in a news article that does not bother to name their sources or offer any proof of their allegations.

I hope this letter provides you the information you need. If you need any other information, please do not hesitate to let me know, and if someone from your headquarters would desire to come my office and go through the papers that I have on hand, they would be welcome.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to provide you with this response.

Thank you for your letter of 10 Jan 94, transmitting the inquiry from the National Archives regarding missing records.

We have reviewed the allegations identified in the <u>Newsweek</u> article, as well as the two previous inquiries referenced in your letter, and maintain that all official documents have been returned to CENTCOM for inclusion in our archival project. Nothing indicates CENTCOM is missing any official documents. Our staff contacted General Schwarzkopf's office last year and was told he does not possess any official CENTCOM documents. However, we are requesting written confirmation that General Schwarzkopf does not possess any original official documents, as the acting Archivist has requested.

Your letter also sought a determination as to whether the "personal logbook" and other documents should be considered official records, according to the guidelines provided. The logbook in question was generated as a means of keeping a personal record of meetings, conversations, and other comments; used to refresh General Schwarzkopf's mind of these events at later dates; created solely for General Schwarzkopfs use; controlled carefully and secured in a safe when not in use; limited from access by even senior staff personnel; and never distributed for commercial reference. Based on these representations, we conclude the logbook in question was personal, rather than official, in nature. Since CENTCOM does not maintain a copy of General Schwarzkopf's personal logbook, any interest by the National Archives in a copy would have to be directed to General Schwarzkopf. As to the official nature of any other materials he may possess, we will forward the result of our inquiry to General Schwarzkopf to your office at such time as he may respond to it.

As you already know, we are scanning all official CENTCOM DESERT SHIELD/STORM records as a part of the EXCALIBUR archival project. We will turn them over to the National Archives following completion, projected for April 1994.

We need your assistance to answer a National Archives query on allegations of missing CENTCOM records. The Acting Archivist of the United States, in response to a 27 Nov 93 <u>Newsweek</u> article, has asked the Secretary of the Air Force to determine if General H. Norman Schwarzkopf has custody of any official CENTCOM records (see Attachment 1). The article addresses the minute-by-minute campaign log kept by General Schwarzkopf's executive officer, as well as phone logs, copies of documents, and graphics.

Your staff has addressed this issue in the two reports referenced in Attachment 1. At this point, the focus seems to be whether General Schwarzkopf's "personal logbook" or other records contained in his personal papers should be considered official records. In his autobiography, <u>It</u> <u>Doesn't Take A Hero</u>, the description of the executive officer's responsibility for maintaining this logbook (pages 303 and 320) raises important legal issues. The pamphlet, <u>Personal Papers of Executive Branch Officials: A Management Guide</u> (Attachment 2), provides general information, but your legal staff should be able to provide legal precedent for records determination.

Resolution of this issue will require personal contact with General Schwarzkopf at an appropriate level. I recognize the difficulties involved, but under federal statutes we must determine whether or not portions of General Schwarzkopf's collection from the Gulf War contain documents that should become part of the National Archives. If you have not already done so, please take the appropriate action to make that determination. In any case, we need a report of your findings to answer the query from National Archives. The Air Force point of contact is Lieutenant Colonel David W. Ferguson, SAF/AAIX, at DSN 225-1667.

Today, I spoke with Dean Allen, the DIA historian, concerning two bodies of material relating to the Gulf War. The first consists of intelligence-related records which CENTCOM is sending to DIA for scanning, prior to transfer to NARA as part of the larger CENTCOM collection. Allen noted that he has not yet gotten the records, but expects them shortly. It may, however, be a number of months before we get the files since I understood him to say that the disk system to be used is not yet in place. I believe these records will be considered part of the larger CENTCOM transfer. Hence, no additional paperwork is needed other than the classified records accountability documentation required to effect the movement of the materials.

The second body of material consists of records which the various DIA offices accumulated during the War. As a follow on to an order issued by the Secretary of Defense, these offices identified their key Desert Storm files and, eventually, sent them to Allen. Allen estimates that he has approximately 1,000,000 pages worth of records, including messages, oversize maps, bomb damage assessment files, and targeting jackets. Material is highly classified (i.e., codeword). He intends to offer these records to NARA after they too are disked. He does not anticipate that records will be ready for transfer for 5-6months. When I asked if the files included much chaff, he said no... That is, offices did not just empty file cabinets, but, rather, sent the best materials on the subjects at issue. These materials will need a separate 258 and possibly an SF 115. Since records will not be ready for a while there is not need to prepare this paperwork immediately. The way we left it was that in late March or early April, I and Jeanne Young (DIA appraisal archivist) will meet with Allen and look at the records. When we set up that meeting, I will also see if we can bring someone from NNT along. We can then confirm the value of the records and prepare the necessary paperwork.

I suggest we send a copy of this memo to NNT and Elaine Everly.

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General Schwarzkopf's files

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We have reviewed the enclosed materials which Air Force sent us concerning allegations that General Schwarzkopf has custody of documentary materials that should be part of the official records of the United States Central Command (CENTCOM). We also have examined extracts of the General's journal that are included in his published memoirs (these are enclosed). Based on this review, it is our conclusion that further NARA action is not warranted.

In a letter to CENTCOM's Chief of Staff, General Schwarzkopf states that the only Desert Shield/Desert Storm materials in his possession are copies of a small number of documents, oversize briefing materials, and a personal log (see Tab 5). Extra copies of documents are not records. Likewise, the charts and boards used in briefings are usually treated as non-record. The record status of logs and journals is not clear-cut. However, based on the information at hand, we see no reason to question Air Force's conclusion that General Schwarzkopf's journal is personal.

In our management guide on the personal papers of executive branch officials, we identify a category of material termed "work-related personal papers." To assist agencies in distinguishing these personal documents from official records, we provide a list of factors for them to consider. Using this guidance, CENTCOM has concluded that General Schwarzkopf's log falls under the rubric of "work-related personal papers" (see Tab 2). We believe that CENTCOM has applied our guidance properly. The log appears to have been created solely for the General's personal use. It was not distributed or made accessible to other officials nor is there any evidence that it was used to conduct agency business. Finally, CENTCOM did not require the creation of this document and made no attempt to control its disposition.

Only two factors could be used to make a case that the log is a record: it was created at agency expense (the General's executive officer actually made the entries) and it contains substantive information concerning official business. However, our guidance states that no single factor is conclusive (except, perhaps, for the assertion of agency control over material through requirements that mandate creation or retention). Furthermore, our guidance recognizes that personal logs may contain important information concerning agency business: "Officials may also wish to keep and maintain at the office for their personal use a journal or diary to record meetings or events or to serve as a memory aid. Determining if these are personal papers depends upon the totality of the circumstances...."

In sum, we see no basis for NARA to dispute Air Force's finding that General Schwarzkopf does not have custody of alienated CENTCOM records. All of the items he acknowledges having can legitimately be regarded as personal or non-record. This includes his log, which does not appear to differ significantly from journals or diaries which traditionally have been deemed personal.

8. ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY: The Unites States Central Command (USCENTCOM) can trace its unofficial lineage to the U.S. Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force (RDJTF), which was activated on March 1, 1980, as a sub-command of the U.S. Readiness Command; with the mission of contingency planning for operations in Southwest Asia, and command and control of potential U.S. forces to be deployed to the region. On January 1, 1983, the U.S. Central Command was activated as a unified command with headquarters at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, succeeding the provisionally-organized RDJTF. USCENTCOM was organized with a strength of approximately 600 personnel, and was given the mission of responsibility for strategic planning, command and control, security assistance, and politico-military coordination for Southwest Asia, encompassing the nations of the Persian Gulf, Red Sea, Horn of Africa, and the Islamic western Indian-Subcontinent.

In 1987, with the Iran-Iraq War at its height, and with maritime traffic in the Persian Gulf threatened by an escalating "tanker war" fought by both sides, USCENTCOM was given the mission of protecting neutral maritime traffic in the Gulf from military attack. Utilizing naval and aerial forces organized into the Joint Task Force Middle-East (JTFME), USCENTCOM launched Operation EARNEST WILL in July 1987, escorting and protecting maritime traffic in the Gulf and periodically conducting military operations against Iranian forces threatening tanker traffic in the region. Operation EARNEST WILL was continued at varying levels of intensity through July of 1990. In August 1989, USCENTCOM also served as the coordinating military headquarters for the U.S. search efforts in Ethiopia for the missing aircraft containing Rep. Mickey Leland and his Congressional delegation. The wreckage of the aircraft was eventually located, with no survivors.

In August 1990, soon after the Iraqi invasion and occupation of Kuwait, USCENTCOM was given the mission of defending Saudi Arabia against attack. Deploying its main headquarters elements to Saudi Arabia, USCENTCOM launched Operation DESERT SHIELD, as massive U.S. forces deployed into the Persian Gulf region to deter further Iraqi aggression. By January 1991, the heavilyaugmented USCENTCOM headquarters had operational command and control of U.S. ground, air, and naval forces totalling approximately 500,000 troops. USCENTCOM also coordinated the operations of Islamic and other forces of the Multinational Coalition, which numbered an additional 160,000 troops.

On January 17, 1991, USCENTCOM began Operation DESERT STORM, a coordinated ground, air, and naval campaign to liberate Kuwait from Iraqi occupation. Combat operations ended on February 28, 1991, with Kuwait liberated and major portions of the Iraqi military destroyed. USCENTCOM then began operations to redeploy U.S. forces out of the region; a process that continued throughout 1991. In April 1991, USCENTCOM headquarters was redeployed back to MacDill AFB, after spending approximately eight months overseas in Saudi Arabia.

With the ending of the 1990-91 Persian Gulf Conflict, USCENTCOM continued its missions in Southwest Asia. In the Persian Gulf region, USCENTCOM began Operation SOUTHERN WATCH, designed to enforce United Nations resolutions against Iraq, including enforcement of "no-fly" zones in portions of the country. Enforcement of these U.N. resolutions has resulted in sporadic military actions taken against Iraq under Operation SOUTHERN WATCH, with command and control provided by USCENTCOM headquarters. In December 1992, USCENTCOM was also given the mission of deploying U.S. troops into Somalia to assist with humanitarian operations in that country. This operations, titled Operation RESTORE HOPE and involving approximately 25,000 U.S. troops, is currently continuing.

We recently learned that employees at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas who were working with documents from Desert Storm, Rwanda, and Haiti were suffering flu-like symptoms. Specifically, they had eye irritations, a burning sensation on their skin, and low energy levels. All the employees' symptoms disappeared when air flow in their work area was increased and when they reduced the amount of time spent working with the documents each day. The Army tested their workplace and found that it did have certain chemical exposures that exceed health standards. The Army believes the records may be the source of this chemical contamination and is trying to determine how and when the records were exposed to these chemicals. Officials suspect that the records were fumigated before they arrived at Fort Leavenworth and that it is an insecticide residue that is causing the symptoms.

As soon as we learned of this problem at Fort Leavenworth, we immediately took steps to insure that similar records in NARA facilities are safe and will not harm our employees or researchers. I want to share with you what we have done, what we now know, and what we will do in the near future.

We have determined that no NARA facility has recent records from Haiti or Rwanda. We do have Desert Storm records in Archives II, the Bush Presidential Materials (NLBP), the Washington National Records Center (WNRC), the Atlanta Records Center (4NC) and the Civilian Personnel (NCPC) and Military Personnel (NCPM) Records Centers at St. Louis. The day after we learned of the Fort Leavenworth problem, our Research and Testing Laboratory in the Preservation Policy and Services Division began testing records in Archives II and in the Washington National Records Center. To date, all these tests have been negative.

In addition, we have contracted with an outside laboratory which will examine the records by using the most sophisticated methods available for testing air quality. The team of scientists will test a random sample of boxes known to contain records associated with Desert Storm. Testing will begin immediately after the laboratory obtains the necessary supplies. As soon as we have test results, I will share them with you.

I believe my most important priority is insuring that NARA employees have a safe work

On March 15, 1996, I met with Maida Loescher (NNP), Susan Lee-Bechtold (NNPD), and representatives from the National Media Lab (NML) and 3M Company regarding the testing of records from RG 518, Records of the U.S. Central Command, in the custody of the National Archives. The records to be tested were created in Saudi Arabia during Operations Desert Shield/Storm and may have been exposed to toxic material. NNTA has custody of two accessions, NN3-518-93-2 (located in stack 631) and a pending 1996 job (currently located in room 3900). 5/8-96-1

The NML and 3M representatives examined the records holding areas and discussed an action plan with NARA. They plan to return to College Park on April 10 and 11 to test selected records and sample the air in the records holding areas. NNP is providing overall logistical coordination for this event; however, NNT will need to provide access to room 3900, someone to move the selected records, and an escort for the NML/ 3M individuals. This may require an individual to be at Archives II until approximately 7:00 p.m. on those days. After they are finished testing the NN records and related records in the custody of WNRC, they will provide a summary briefing and issue a report.

Last winter we learned that some employees at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, were suffering flu-like symptoms after working with documents from Operation Desert Storm. As soon as we learned of this problem, we took measures to ensure that similar records in National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) facilities are not contaminated and present no danger to our employees or researchers. We identified all the NARA facilities containing Desert Storm records, and our Research and Testing Laboratory in the Preservation Policy and Services Division (NNP) immediately began testing the Desert Storm records in Archives II and in the Washington National Records Center.

All those tests were totally negative, but we wanted to make certain we had used the most sophisticated testing methods possible so we could be completely assured of the safety of these records. We, therefore, contracted with the National Media Laboratory (NML) in St. Paul, Minnesota, to test records in Archives II and in the Washington National Records Center that were generated in the theater of operations during Desert Shield/Desert Storm. During their testing, the contractors were looking specifically for phosgene and phosphine, the two gases that were identified as present in the boxes housing Desert Storm records at Leavenworth. In making their measurements, NML personnel sampled the air in the stacks, the air around the boxes containing Desert Storm records, and the air in those boxes. In selected instances, records were placed in a special chamber or cell and allowed to off-gas, and the resulting gases were analyzed. NML also shipped air samples back to St. Paul and did further testing on the samples to verify their findings here. To the level that they are able to measure for phosgene and phosphine, which is well below Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) allowable limits for these gases, they were unable to find any trace of either gas in our air or on the tested records. We are, therefore, confident that the Desert Storm records in Archives II and in WNRC contain no dangerous chemical contaminants and present no health hazard. In addition, we believe there is no need to test Desert Storm records that are now located in other NARA facilities or that are delivered to NARA offices in the future.

This memorandum will provide a summary of my detail with U.S. Central Command (USCENTCOM) from 31 July through 26 August 1994, as well as a few recommendations on how to proceed with the project once the remaining DESERT STORM records have been shipped to WNRC.

I was detailed to USCENTCOM on 31 July with the task of arranging and describing approximately 25 feet of residual DESERT STORM records located after the conclusion of the initial 1992-93 project. I was scheduled to complete the detail on 19 August, but due to disruptions caused by a change-in-command at USCENTCOM, as well as extra arrangement work needed on some disorganized records, I was forced to stay an extra week and did not complete the detail until 26 August. While at USCENTCOM, I arranged and described 15 new series, totalling 42 LGA-S archives boxes, for inclusion in RG 518 records (series descriptions are attached). I also arranged 15 boxes of records that are to be interfiled into 8 existing series created previously in 1992-93. The main problem I encountered was the considerable disarray found in the residual records of the J-4/7 Logistics and Security Assistance Directorate. These records were found in a state of complete disorganization and required considerable time to rebuild the arrangement, hence the delay in the completion of the project.

The final series I processed was the Commander in Chief's File, namely General Schwarzkopf's office file. Records in this series consist mainly of background reference material such as briefing outlines and charts, staff studies, maps, and some message traffic, with a sprinkling of high-level personal correspondence and memorandums. At this time, approximately 40 documents are either still in the process of being downgraded, or have been destroyed as decided by a declassification/destruction committee formed by USCENTCOM. Reasons given for the destruction of these documents were that they were non-record material, duplicates, routine nonpermanent records, or otherwise not worth keeping. A comprehensive inventory list of the Schwarzkopf files, as well as a list of those documents being withheld for review or destroyed, are attached. I also had a chance to examine the DESERT STORM Adjutant General Awards File and the UNOSOM/USFORSOM Somalia records. The AG Awards File consists of approximately 20 FRC-equivalent boxes, and have been scanned by USCENTCOM, but was not arranged nor described by me as per your direction. These records are going to be sent to Suitland soon, and will require arrangement and description. I was also able to examine some Somalia records created by the U.S. Joint Task Force there. These records are all in binders, and are in a state of complete disarrangement. Extensive arrangement and description work will be needed before they can be scanned by USCENTCOM.

Finally, I want to mention briefly what I think needs to be done after the records are shipped to Suitland. Due to the amount of records that needs to be interfiled with existing series, I would recommend that I be permitted to work on the interfiling and integration precess once the records have been shipped to Suitland. It should take approximately 5 to 7 working days to completely interfile the records, keeping in mind that some records need to be interfiled at the document or folder levels. I also recommend that, if possible, NNTA-S hold off on any extensive work on the existing RG 518 records until the newly-scanned residual records have arrived, perhaps in about 4 to 6 weeks. This will permit the new records to be interfiled and integrated into the existing material, and reduce the need of having to redo certain project work after the interfiling is completed. Finally, I recommend that it is not too early for NARA to begin discussions with USCENTCOM on how both agencies want to proceed on the Somalia records. Subjects that need to be discussed include whether USCENTCOM wants a NARA archivist to again go to MacDill AFB to process records before scanning, the scope of the project, and the time-period and volume of records involved. USCENTCOM is thinking about beginning the Somalia scanning project early next year; it is not too early to begin discussing the feasibility and mechanics of this project now.





On this date Susan Lee Bechtold, NNPD and myself tested the records in this accession for the presence of the gas phosgene. All boxes indicated as coming from CENTCOM Forward in Saudi Arabia were tested. The results ranged from 0 to .1 parts per million (ppm), the lowest range the testing instrument would register. It is believed, however that this .1 reading is not statistically significant, as some measurements of the surrounding air in Room 3900 at Archives II also registered .1 ppm.

Test strips for the presence of phosgene have also been inserted into these records.

On March 15, 1996, I met with Maida Loescher (NNP), Susan Lee-Bechtold (NNPD), and representatives from the National Media Lab (NML) and 3M Company regarding the testing of records from RG 518, Records of the U.S. Central Command, in the custody of the National Archives. The records to be tested were created in Saudi Arabia during Operations Desert Shield/Storm and may have been exposed to toxic material. NNTA has custody of two accessions, NN3-518-93-2 (located in stack 631) and a pending 1996 job (currently located in room 3900). 518-96-1

The NML and 3M representatives examined the records holding areas and discussed an action plan with NARA. They plan to return to College Park on April 10 and 11 to test selected records and sample the air in the records holding areas. NNP is providing overall logistical coordination for this event; however, NNT will need to provide access to room 3900, someone to move the selected records, and an escort for the NML/ 3M individuals. This may require an individual to be at Archives II until approximately 7:00 p.m. on those days. After they are finished testing the NN records and related records in the custody of WNRC, they will provide a summary briefing and issue a report.

8. ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY: The Unites States Central Command (USCENTCOM) can trace its unofficial lineage to the U.S. Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force (RDJTF), which was activated on March 1, 1980, as a sub-command of the U.S. Readiness Command; with the mission of contingency planning for operations in Southwest Asia, and command and control of potential U.S. forces to be deployed to the region. On January 1, 1983, the U.S. Central Command was activated as a unified command with headquarters at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, succeeding the provisionally-organized RDJTF. USCENTCOM was organized with a strength of approximately 600 personnel, and was given the mission of responsibility for strategic planning, command and control, security assistance, and politico-military coordination for Southwest Asia, encompassing the nations of the Persian Gulf, Red Sea, Horn of Africa, and the Islamic western Indian-Subcontinent.

In 1987, with the Iran-Iraq War at its height, and with maritime traffic in the Persian Gulf threatened by an escalating "tanker war" fought by both sides, USCENTCOM was given the mission of protecting neutral maritime traffic in the Gulf from military attack.

Utilizing naval and aerial forces organized into the Joint Task Force Middle-East (JTFME), USCENTCOM launched Operation EARNEST WILL in July 1987, escorting and protecting maritime traffic in the Gulf and periodically conducting military operations against Iranian forces threatening tanker traffic in the region. Operation EARNEST WILL was continued at varying levels of intensity through July of 1990. In August 1989, USCENTCOM also served as the coordinating military headquarters for the U.S. search efforts in Ethiopia for the missing aircraft containing Rep. Mickey Leland and his Congressional delegation. The wreckage of the aircraft was eventually located, with no survivors.

In August 1990, soon after the Iraqi invasion and occupation of Kuwait, USCENTCOM was given the mission of defending Saudi Arabia against attack. Deploying its main headquarters elements to Saudi Arabia, USCENTCOM launched Operation DESERT SHIELD, as massive U.S. forces deployed into the Persian Gulf region to deter further Iraqi aggression. By January 1991, the heavily-augmented USCENTCOM headquarters had operational command and control of U.S. ground, air, and naval forces totalling approximately 500,000 troops. USCENTCOM also coordinated the operations of Islamic and other forces of the Multinational Coalition, which numbered an additional 160,000 troops.

On January 17, 1991, USCENTCOM began Operation DESERT STORM, a coordinated ground, air, and naval campaign to liberate Kuwait from Iraqi occupation. Combat operations ended on February 28, 1991, with Kuwait liberated and major portions of the Iraqi military destroyed. USCENTCOM then began operations to redeploy U.S. forces out of the region; a process that continued throughout 1991. In April 1991, USCENTCOM headquarters was redeployed back to MacDill AFB, after spending approximately eight months overseas in Saudi Arabia.

With the ending of the 1990-91 Persian Gulf Conflict, USCENTCOM continued its missions in Southwest Asia. In the Persian Gulf region, USCENTCOM began Operation SOUTHERN WATCH, designed to enforce United Nations resolutions against Iraq, including enforcement of "no-fly" zones in portions of the country. Enforcement of these U.N. resolutions has resulted in sporadic military actions taken against Iraq under Operation SOUTHERN WATCH, with command and control provided by USCENTCOM headquarters. In December 1992, USCENTCOM was also given the mission of deploying U.S. troops into Somalia to assist with humanitarian operations in that country. This operation was designated Operation RESTORE HOPE and eventually involved approximately 25,000 U.S. troops. The operation was transferred to United Nations control in May, 1993, and U.S. involvement in Somalia came to an end in late 1994. As of May, 1996, the U.S. Central Command is continuing with its missions of providing strategic command and control and politicomilitary coordination for the Southwest Asia region.


